(A regency style villa)

↗ Grade II* listed.

- A famous writer called Elizabeth Gaskell once lived here, from 1850 - 1865. That's more than 100 years ago!!

★ 2 THE PANKHURST CENTRE

- A woman called Emmeline Pankhurst lived here between 1898 and 1908.

She wanted women to have the right to vote. She set up the 'Women's Social and Political Union' which later became known as THE SUFFRAGETTES. Suffrage means the right to vote.

Look out for a window like this!

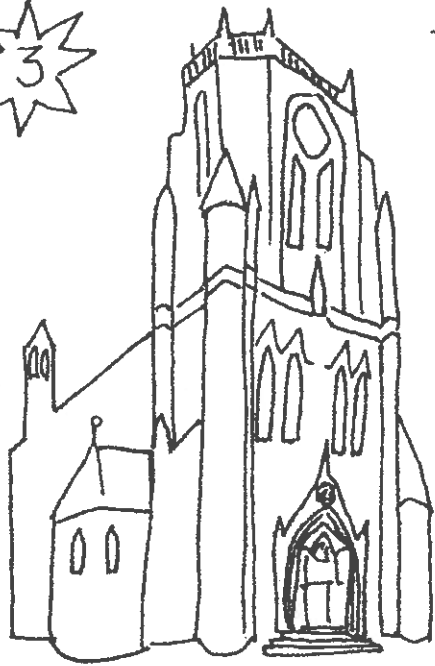


On Oxford Road, Can you see a white house with a pink door?

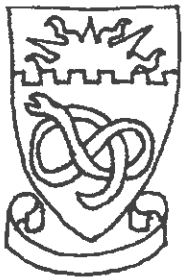


Can you find 2 golden Angels with trumpets?
